Impact of 2022-23 PE and Sports Premium Funding					

- As in previous years the Rise continues to work with their students to undo years
 of mistrust that they have built up through their experiences of PE in alternative
 settings. This is managed through a person centred approach to PE and a lesson
 structure that encourages fun, learning and competition in ways that the cohort can
 digest.
- The continued bespoke and individualised support of pupils as required as well as use of appropriate (size, material, etc) equipment has led to improved learning outcomes, specifically with regards to fine and gross motor skills.
- From assessments (which includes formative pre and post unit audit of skill levels and summative PE assessments x 3 a year) there is clear evidence that pupils are gaining in skills and PE specific knowledge.
- The Rise have experienced significant increases of participation and engagement in PE lessons as a result of the redesigned curriculum. The revised curriculum ensures a broader PE experience and as a result, as well as increasing engagement, it has and is more likely to encourage long term participation and passion for sport. An example of this is the desire to start up more advanced rugby classes and the possible introduction of a school rugby team.
